The ride was from the RBLI headquarters in Aylesford to Ypres in Belgium, where we attended the Last Post at the Menin Gate. Speakership of the Confederation of the Cinque Ports comes to Hythe

The Cinque Ports
Cradle of the Royal Navy

The Confederation is a unique association of maritime towns and villages in Kent and East Sussex, dating back 1000 years. The Confederation of Cinque Ports is comprised of the Ports of Dover, Hastings, Hythe, New Romney, and Sandwich, and the Ancient Towns of Rye and Winchelsea. The Limbs are Deal, Faversham, Folkestone, Lydd, Margate, Ramsgate, and Tenterden.

In the centuries before the Tudor Kings of England first developed a standing navy, the men and ships of the Cinque Ports provided a fleet to meet the military and transportation needs of their Royal masters. With good reason, these small ports have been dubbed the Cradle of the Royal Navy. The Cinque Ports first came together in order to render Ship Service to the English Crown in return for valuable privileges, during late Saxon or early Norman times; reaching the peak of their power and prestige some 200 to 300 years later. Their naval service was last called upon in 1596, to meet the threat of the Spanish Armada. Few of their ancient rights and privileges survive, but the Confederation continues to promote public awareness of the proud history and seafaring traditions of communities which played a key role in the early development of Great Britain as a naval and economic superpower.

The quiet charm of many of the Cinque Port towns belies their important and sometimes violent role in the development of the nation's seafaring and naval traditions. Some survive as working ports. Indeed, Dover is a major international transport hub, handling some 5 million vehicles and 13 million passengers per year. Others, like Hastings, maintain their historic role as centres of inshore fishing. New Romney, Winchelsea and Tenterden, in particular, have been stranded well inland by the retreating sea. It is sometimes hard to believe that all were once amongst the most significant ports in England.

Ship service was a heavy burden for relatively small fishing communities and so the five head ports of Hastings, Romney, Hythe, Dover and Sandwich turned to their neighbouring towns and villages for help in providing ships, equipment and men. These limbs or members, as they were known, did not at first share in the privileges granted to the head ports.

Speaker of the Cinque Ports

The Speaker acts as chairman and principal representative of the Confederation. The office is held (ex officio) by the mayor of each of the head ports and two ancient towns, in turn. It passes from one town to the next, on 21 May each year, by a process quaintly described as 'septennial revolution'. This year, 2022 – 2023, the honour has come to Hythe, and The Right Worshipful Mayor of Hythe Councillor Jim Martin, has now taken up this role.

The major event of the year will be Speakers Day, to be held on Saturday 01 October 2022, when all the Cinque Ports Mayors, and various dignitaries will join together for a Civic Procession Hythe and attend a church service in St Leonards Church.

Queen's Platinum Jubilee



A special extended bank holiday weekend provided an opportunity for communities and people throughout the United Kingdom to come together to celebrate this historic milestone.

Thursday 02 June 2022

The Town Crier announced the lighting of the Beacon at 1400hrs on the High Street. The Town gathered along the seafront to watch the Piper play Diu Regnare at 2135hrs followed by the Bugler who played Majesty at 2140.

The Right Worship Mayor of Hythe Councillor Jim Martin lit the beacon at 2145hrs. The Deputy Lieutenant, Mayor Dennis Bradley BEM delivered a speech thanking Her Majesty the Queen for her selfless commitment to the country. The Town Mayor Councillor Jim Martin lead the crowd in singing the National Anthem.





Friday 03 June 2022

A service of Thanksgiving was delivered by the Churches Together in Hythe and Saltwood. The service was led by Revd Michael Darkins from the Bandstand in Oaklands. The service was popular with the residents.

Saturday 04 June 2022

The Town Mayor started Saturday by joining HTBA on their walk through the High Street. HBTA invited the Mayor to award the 'Best Homemade Crown' and 'Best Jubilee Shop Window' for HBTA. In continuing the Jubilee celebrations U3A Swing Band played in the Undercroft at the Town Hall.

During the evening Hullabaloo Band played on the Bandstand in Oaklands.





Queen's Platinum Jubilee

The Triangle An update from HTCG

In August 2021, we shared with readers our aspiration to create a 'haven for wildlife that attracts the eye of passers-by and my gosh did we do that!

Anyone passing the Triangle now cannot help but notice our wildflower meadow coming into full bloom. Daisies, cornflowers, poppies, and other native wildflowers sowed earlier in the year have blossomed and created something beautiful that passers-by adore, and bugs and bees visit with absolute delight.

The meadow will continue to bloom over the summer and in that time, we'll be working out what our permanent planting plans are.

In tandem with Hythe Hops, we have installed oak barrels and a magnificent hop arch at the entrance to the garden. Hops from the Triangle will be added to other hops grown locally to make craft beer.

We have undertaken some very low key fundraising this year and have raised enough to employ a local contractor to rebuild and repoint the Windmill Street part of the boundary wall.

Seeing the wildflower meadow and the boundary wall being repaired is truly magnificent and is a significant milestone for our team and project.

We could not have got to this point without our donors, including many Hythe residents. We're also grateful to Waitrose and Councillors Georgina Treloar, Jim Martin, and Lesley Whybrow who each awarded us funds from their ward grant.

The contribution from volunteers on site is nothing short of extraordinary. In the past year, they have totally removed the membrane that suffocated the site and they have cleared masses of invasive weed growth.

Hythe Green Wood Inauguration

On Saturday 18th June Hythe Green Preservation Society was happy to stage a celebration of the new Hythe Green Wood. It was extremely well attended and served as an opportunity for everyone to explore the space and to examine the trees as well as our fantastic Green Spirit wood carving at the heart of it.

We were supported by local handbells playing a variety of traditional airs as well as enjoying live music from experienced and talented musicians Mortlake who beat the bounds of the wood and sang songs during the ceremony.

The 100-plus trees are also a contribution the Queen's Diamond Jubilee nationwide 'Green Canopy' initiative and represent a significant addition to local biodiversity as well as an enhancement to a local amenity.

Kent Kite Flyers also took part and provided a spectacular backdrop for the young woodland. The Scouts and Guides, Hythe Hops were also in attendance, as was local brewer Dockers, with a range of beers. We were particularly pleased to have the Mayor give his blessing and a short address before a toast (in apple juice) to the Wood was drunk.

The wood is establishing itself strongly and we will continue to water and protect it over the next few months while it settles in. Hythe Green Preservation Society plans to complete the wood in Autumn with replacement planting of any unsuccessful trees as well as a row of fifty new cherry plums planted at the curved edge eventually to provide a shaded path between the wood and the Green.





Princess Diana Sensory Garden

Repairs to Fencing

The Princess Diana Sensory Garden was established at Oaklands, Hythe, in memory of Diana, Princess of Wales, following her death in 1997.

Recently, the garden underwent a transformation. Following a programme of cutting back and weed clearance, the volunteers alongside Hythe Town Council repaired the fencing surrounding the Diana Garden.

Eaton Lands - Hythe's Hidden Gem

An ancient quarry could soon become "Hythe's hidden gem", say local volunteers who plan to transform it into a centre for walking, wildlife and biodiversity.

Eaton Lands, between Hythe and historic Saltwood Castle was used for allotments in the Second World War but was sadly neglected for many year after. The site, which enjoys spectacular views over the Channel is being restored, made safe and rewilded by Hythe and District Countryside Spokesman David Barker said "We are removing dangerous trees, clearing overgrown footpaths, thus creating habitats for animals and insects." One talented member of the Hythe community has even begun to create a sculpture garden which they hope to make permanent.

The area, originally donated by the Deeds family, was nearly lost to a building project in the 1980s. The idea was seen off by a vigorous protest campaign. The lands now have charitable status and cannot e developed.

Kent Wildlife Trust has already backed the scheme with a grant for new shrubs and trees, while for the Councils Town Clerk Julie Abbott said "Hythe Town Council are extremely grateful to 'The Hythe and District Countryside Volunteers, who have been amazing. This is just a small part of the larger efforts that they volunteer to do for free for the residents of Hythe at Eaton Lands".

The big problem is finding more people admits David "We are desperate tp attract more volunteers to keep up maintenance programme and with the planting of more whips and woodland native flowers. If someone can offer us perhaps event a few hours a week, that can made a real difference. It will be one more part of Kent's rich heritage."



Hythe Museum

About the Museum

The local history museum is based within the Town Council office, a former Doctor's home and surgery adjacent to the Royal Military Canal, and accessed via the local library.

Its collection is set out in cases along with detailed information boards. These take visitors through the history of Hythe from Roman times and then as a Cinque Port, with maps, furniture, costume, military equipment (linked to the Small Arms School of Musketry in Hythe for over 100 years before it was moved to Warminster), commercial, civic and social objects. Each one provides for different age groups enabling them to find inspiration, learning and enjoyment from the collection resulting in frequent re-visits and numerous related questions.

Hythe Museum is open during Library hours.

A Museum does not have

to stay the same!

Actually a museum should display different items over time because time just doesn't stand still – it continually moves on with events happening each day.

In recent years we have tried to ring the changes at Hythe museum to ensure that there is something new to discover each year. This involves delving into the existing collection, arranging loans or receiving donations.

This year has provided an opportunity to display various items from Jubilees that have been celebrated in the last hundred and thirty five years or so. To do so, items have been found in our store, bought or kindly loaned. As a result our Platinum Jubilee display is worth a visit and will be available for all to see through the summer ahead. Many of the items on show are due to very kind loans including tea wear, figurines, coins and photographs, for which we are very grateful. There's even a short hunt for visitors of all ages to enjoy.



Hythe Museum

With regard to donations - at the beginning of the year the museum received the donation of six medals belonging to the late Sgt. Edward (Ted) Whitticks. These include the Territorial Service Efficiency Medal and the Legion d'Honneur and add to our fine collection of medals reflecting the service and sacrifice of those in the past during times of conflict.

Alternatively you might like to take a look at another donation – a plaque which was once fixed to one of the earliest bridges in Hythe. The stone dates from 1728 which pre-dates the construction of the Royal Military Canal by about seventy five years. Naturally, the stone is now an important part of the museum.

Finally, for families – did you know that the museum is part of the Wheels of Time group of Kent museums? Following a visit to the museum all you need to do is call into the library to collect your Wheels of Time badge and then spend the rest of the summer holiday visiting other participating museums to see if you can collect up to fifty badges in all.

So, don't stand still - why not visit the museum this summer - look for any changes that have taken place since you last came - you might even like to take a look at our touchscreen which presents other aspects of Hythe's history in a very different way.

Works too extend the John Button room are now under discussion and an update will be provided in the next newsletter.


